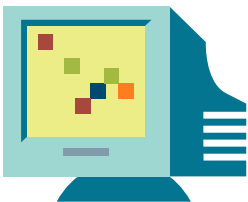
Literature Recitation – a JRHS Fall Tradition

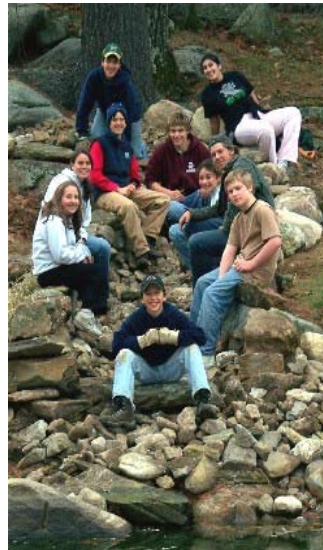

JRHS POND ECOLOGY PROJECT WITH CHARMINGFARE FARM IS COMPLETED

Pond Ecology – A student's perspective

Pond Ecology is a Project Based Learning class offered on Tuesdays and Thursdays. In this class we studied the local Charmingfare Farm pond (the one next to the road.). We studied the pond and found out it was getting an overdose of nutrients, also known as a eutrophic pond. As a class, we decided to build a waterfall on the side of the pond (which can be clearly seen when passing Charmingfare Farm). This will help circulate the water to help get the algae to not reproduce as much. Before we had to build the foundation though, we had to study the environment of the pond, and all the possible ways it was receiving the nutrients. This project was done on November 5, 2007 and the foundation was finished. Later this year, most likely in the spring, we will install the pump and hopefully a windmill to power it!
